Bible: Hebrews 6:1-20

Intro) As a believer of Christ, what do you think one of the most important things in your lives?

Read Hebrews 6:1-2.

How can we grow our faiths in God?

What does this mean, "not laying again the foundation of repentance from acts that lead to death"?

The repentance is metanoia (μετάνοια) in Greek. Meta is 'change' and Noia is 'idea or think'. The repentance means 'change our sinful thoughts and acts to become children of God.' After the believers repent their sins, they would be forgiven by God. They are given the eternal life, so they are supposed to enter the heaven.

Read Hebrews 6:4-6.

What does this passage mean?

Do you think that even believers can lose their faith and turn away from God?

Read John 10:27-28, Hebrews 3:14, and Mark 13:13.

What do these passage mean?

Why did the author of Hebrews urged believers of Christ to hold firmly until the end in Hebrews 3:14?

Read Hebrews 6:11-12.

Why did the author of Hebrews encourage believers of Christ to endure their hardships through faith and patience?

Read Romans 5:3-4.

Why did God allow his people to endure sufferings?

Read Hebrews 6:13-15 and Genesis 12:1-2.

What does this mean, "I will surely bless you and give you many descendants"?

Read Hebrews 6:16-18.

What does this passage mean?

Read Hebrews 6:19-20.

Why was Jesus called, “anchor for the soul”?

What does this passage mean, “It enters the inner sanctuary behind the curtain, where Jesus, who went before us, has entered on our behalf. He has become a high priest forever, in the order of Melchizedek”?
